14 15	WHEREAS , the City of South Fulton ("City") is a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Georgia;
16 17 18	WHEREAS , the duly elected governing authority of the City, is the Mayor and Council thereof ("City Council");
19 20 21 22	WHEREAS , the City is authorized pursuant to the Georgia Constitution, O.C.G.A. §38-3-28, and the City Charter Section 1.12(b)(8) to impose necessary rules and regulations for emergency management purposes and to preserve the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City;
23 24 25 26 27	WHEREAS , the City and governments across the world are currently responding in an emergency capacity to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus ("COVID-19");
28 29 30	WHEREAS , the World Health Organization ("WHO") has declared the COVID-19 Virus, commonly referred to as the Coronavirus, a global pandemic;
31 32 33 34 35	WHEREAS , the Center for Disease Control ("CDC") has issued guidance on the emerging and rapidly evolving situation of the COVID-19 pandemic, including advisement on or about March 16, 2020, that all events in the United States of ten (10) or more people should be cancelled or held virtually;
36 37	WHEREAS , on March 17, 2020, the City Council declared that a state of emergency exists within the City with respect to the Coronavirus epidemic;
38 39 40 41 42	WHEREAS , during March of 2020, the United States President and Georgia Governor issued emergency declarations to address and mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic;

46	WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds and declares that a state of emergency
47	continues to exist within the City with respect to the COVID-19 epidemic;

50	reasonable provisions for mitigating the spread and impact of COVID-19; and

59	COVID-19, for the effective duration of this Ordinance, no person shall engage
60	in non-essential public travel within the City daily between the hours of 9p.m. and 7a.m. Non-essential public travel shall consist of all outdoor travel within

75	9p.m., travel by persons within the City shall be restricted to the four essential

¹ This Ordinance is enacted on an emergency basis to mitigate and combat the growing threat of COVID-19.

² The public is encouraged to exercise inside their residences, where possible. Members of the public shall only be permitted to engage in outdoor exercise, such as walking, hiking or jogging, within the City during the hours of 7a.m. to 9p.m., so long as such activities occur within .5 miles of their residence while maintaining, where practicable, a minimum six-foot distance from other persons.

imminent danger and harm, all businesses within the City shall prohibit indoor access to the general public daily from 9p.m. to 7a.m.³

- D. <u>Temporary Public Closure of Non-Essential Businesses</u>⁴. No business within the City which is not listed as an Essential Business under this Ordinance shall permit indoor access to the general public for the effective duration of this Ordinance. A business which is not identified as an Essential Business under this Ordinance, i.e. (Barbershops, Nail Salons, etc.) shall not qualify as an Essential Business merely because it is housed inside of an Essential Business. All Non-Essential Businesses must thus close access to the public, irrespective of whether they are located within an Essential Business. This Ordinance shall not prevent Non-Essential Businesses from engaging with the public telephonically, electronically and/or by mail.
- E. Essential Government and Infrastructure Operations: Nothing in this Ordinance shall prohibit the performance of "Essential Government and Infrastructure Operations," which include: 1) all government services needed to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and 2) utility, water, sewer, gas, electrical, oil refining, roads and highways, railroads, public transportation, taxi/rideshare, solid waste collection and removal, internet and telecommunication operations (including the provision of essential global, national, and local infrastructure for computing services, business infrastructure, communications, and web-based services).
- **F.** <u>Social Distancing and Related Public Health Information</u>. All public assemblages, events and gatherings of ten (10) or more persons are prohibited within the City. To the greatest extent practical, all persons, visitors and employees are encouraged to maintain six-foot social distancing from other persons. Persons at high risk of severe illness and/or death from COVID-19, which include the elderly and persons with pre-existing medical conditions/weakened immune systems, are urged to stay in their residence to the greatest extent practicable. Residents, businesses and visitors are encouraged to visit the websites of the following organizations to obtain health information concerning COVID-19:

166		license and/or permit shall constitution a violation of this Ordinance, subjecting
167		violators to punishment as allowed by City Code of Ordinances 3-2010 and 5-

170	Н.	City Facilities Closed to Public. City-owned public facilities, parks,
171		playgrounds and recreation centers, shall remain closed to the public for the

176	I.	City Meetings. All regular City Meetings, including regular meetings of City
177		boards, agencies and commissions, are cancelled through the effective
178		duration of this Ordinance. This Ordinance shall not prohibit City boards,
179		agencies and commissions from conducting special meetings by
180		teleconference, subject to participation being conducted by all persons
181		remotely and in accordance with Open Meeting Laws.

183	J.	Extension and Non-substantial Changes. Due to the continuing and
184		evolving nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, the City Council hereby authorizes
185		the Mayor, after consultation with the City Attorney and notice to the City
186		Council, to make and publish non-substantial changes to this Ordinance,
187		which may include extension of the effective duration of this Ordinance for a
188		period of up to 16 days.

190	K.	Non-compliance . Violations of this Ordinance shall be punishable as allowed
191		by law, which punishment may include incarceration and/or fines up to One
192		Thousand Dollars (\$1000) per occurrence.
193		
194	L.	Effective Duration of Ordinance . This Ordinance shall become effective
195		upon its adoption on April 2, 2020 and shall remain in effect by and through
196		April 16, 2020, unless extended by the Mayor or City Council. This Ordinance
197		is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or
198		procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the City and/or
199		the City's departments, agencies, entities, officers, employees, contractors,
